# **Diversity and Inclusion Policy Development and Implementation**

AIR partnered with the Illinois Department of Human Rights in 2016 to develop best practices to prevent discrimination and promote diversity and inclusion in education. This included developing metrics to identify achievement gaps based on race, ethnicity, and zip code; AIR also served as an expert partner on the Educational Equity Committee (facilitated by the Chicago Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights Under Law), helping identify and address barriers to opportunity for students in Illinois.

#### **Strengthening Educator Diversity**

Beginning in 2017, AIR partnered with the Kellogg Foundation to address issues of teacher diversity and to strengthen the pipeline for K-12 teachers of color. AIR experts and data analysts are researching teacher diversity issues, and promoting strategies based on this work. We have also gathered a diverse group of leaders to craft a set of resources and tools that school districts and their local partners will soon test on the ground in a range of local contexts. □


#### **Equity-Focused Technical Assistance**

AlR's Equity Project joined the Mid-Atlantic Equity Consortium (MAEC) and WestEd to create the Center for Education Equity (CEE) in 2016. CEE draws on the body of equity research literature to provide technical assistance and training to states, districts, schools, and community-based organizations within the Mid-Atlantic and Northeastern regions. CEE builds the systematic capacity of public education systems to address problems caused by segregation and inequities. CEE also works to increase educational opportunities for all students regardless of race, gender, religion, and national origin.

#### **School Finance Research and Evaluation**

In 2013, AIR experts completed the four-year Strategic School Funding For Results (SSFR) project, funded by the Ford Foundation, the William and Flora Hewlett Foundation, and the U.S. Department of Education's Institute of Education Sciences. The project **gave district and school leaders a more efficient and effective way to distribute resources**. SSFR created a system that gave schools flexibility in how they used resources, and created a web-based platform schools could use to outline and share the strategies they developed. □
